NEW GUIDANCE FOR POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS DOGS

The City Council passed new regulations regarding changes to EMC 5.05.121 and 5.05.123 "Potentially Dangerous Dog". The new ruling provides for an appeal process should a dog be declared potentially dangerous and this ruling is consistent with recent case law regarding due process. While this declaration is tantamount to a warning, recent court decisions support a

provision for appeal in support of due process. This action is consistent with local neighboring jurisdictions.

HURRAY!!! O.L.A.E. BECOMES CERTIFIED SHORE STEWARDS

OLAE is now a proud member of the Washington Shore Stewards program. This volunteer stewardship program provides information and resources to waterfront property owners to learn how to protect and enrich the shoreline habitats of Puget Sound. By educating waterfront owners about habitat friendly waters and shoreline practices we are actively creating healthier waters, for our native birds, fish and wildlife.

Shore Stewards Guidelines for shoreline living include

Use Water Wisely:

When you conserve water, more water stays in the natural environment, which helps keep our streams flowing even during the drier summer periods.

Control Pest Wisely:

Most pesticides utilize chemicals that have harmful effects on plants and animals. The chemicals are slow to break down and can end up contaminating surface water run-off and groundwater. Options: use pesticides sparingly or utilize pest resistant plants.

Manage Water Runoff:

Reducing or eliminating paved (hard) surfaces to reduce amount of surface water flow. Restoring or increasing native vegetation along shorelines can reduce surface flow.

Encourage Native Plants and Trees:

Native trees and shrubs can absorb large amounts of water, reducing the amount of water runoff and erosion at waterfront bluffs.

Respect Intertidal Life:

Investigate and have fun, but leave the beach cleaner than you found it. Respect the intertidal species that make their homes on the beach (and in the tidal zone).


So please remember, a healthy park is a clean park. When park users pick up after their dogs it helps keep the Puget Sound clean.
